# Improving Indoor Air Quality with Plants

We know about air pollution - it's outside - coming from industry and automobiles. Sometimes you can see it or smell it. But did you know indoor air pollution is 2-5 times greater than outdoor? Many of our household products, building materials and even home furnishings are major contributors to poor indoor air quality. And these are all around us! And with our air conditioned, properly-sealed homes, there is hardly an escape.

Volatile organic compounds (VOCs) are emitted as gases from certain solids and liquids. These are found in paints, varnishes, waxes, cleaning and disinfecting supplies, cosmetics, degreasers and hobby products. They are also in fuels, dry cleaned clothes, and pesticides. Exposure includes both short and long-term effects such as eye, nose and throat irritation, headaches, nausea, problems associated with the central nervous system and even more serious effects.

How can we protect ourselves? Minimize the use of VOCs and use indoor plants! There are plants that can thrive indoors and have even been studied as to their air cleansing properties. NASA did a study "Interior Landscape Plants for Indoor Air Pollution Abatement," and here are a few of the best (and they grow really well here in Florida):

- 1. **Aloe** clears formaldehyde and benzene and is also good for cuts and burns! Grow it in a sunny window.
- 2. **Spider Plant** Clears benzene, formaldehyde, and xylene. And it is safe for kids and pets! Grow in bright indirect light.
- 3. **Snake Plant -** *Sanseveria* also known as mother-in-law tongue. Removes formaldehyde. Grows well in low light and loves the steamy bathroom environment. Another great place put it in your bedroom...it releases O2 at night and takes up CO2...opposite the timing for other plants. So it is thought to be a big help in a good night sleep.
- 4. **Heart-leaf Philodendron** This is toxic so watch around pets and kids who might like to eat leaves! It removes VOCs and formaldehyde. This plant likes indirect light and has a trailing habit. It grows well in hanging baskets..
- 5. **Bamboo Palm** Removes benzene and tricholoroethylene and formaldehyde. This plant grows best in high humidity and bright but indirect light.
- 6. **Ivy** Removes formaldehyde and airborne fecal matter particles. It is aggressive when grown outdoors but is well behaved inside in pots.
- 7. **Ficus** For formaldehyde, benzene and tricholorethylene. Bright indirect light is best.
- 8. **Dracena** Removes trichloroethylene and formaldehyde. Bright indirect light.
- 9. **Pothos** Removes formaldehyde. Bright indirect light but is toxic to pets! Great in hanging baskets up and away from pets.

Maybe a good sales pitch for the plant sale!

# Highlights from the SIA Annual Report for FY 2014-15

At the end of FY14-15, our federation comprised twenty countries and territories, including Argentina, Bolivia, Brazil, Canada, Chile, Colombia, Ecuador, Guam, Japan, Korea, Mexico, Northern Mariana Islands, Panama, Paraguay, Peru, Philippines, Puerto Rico, Taiwan, United States, and Venezuela with 31,019 members in 1,298 clubs.

Live Your Dream Awards were given to 1,293 women including \$1.77 million in education grants. 78% of Soroptimist clubs participated.

Disaster Relief Grants of \$132,938 were awarded for eight disaster relief projects.

Dream It, Be It began with 19,610 volunteer hours contributed to program planning. \$127,810 was spent to support local Dream It, Be It projects.
